Restorative Justice

Redefines crime as a violation of people and relationships. It creates obligations to make things right. Justice involves the victim, the offender, and the community in a search for solutions which promote repair, reconciliation, and reassurance.

~Howard Zehr

Restorative Justice

- Innovative alternative to the judicial system.
- Accountability for deviant behavior.
- Everyone (including the victim) works collectively toward a solution.
- Addresses the root causes.
- Community-based solutions decrease the likelihood of recurrence.



Juvenile Detention

LA County spends more than \$233,000 per year to hold each youth in juvenile detention.

Comparable jurisdictions:

Chicago \$204,400

San Diego \$127,750

Houston \$84,680



Disproportionality

Youth of color represent roughly 41% of the U.S. population, but they make up more than 2/3 of the youth placed in detention centers across the country.

Justice System Comparison

Traditional

- What law was broken?
- Who broke the law?
- How should we punish the offender?
- Court determines punishment based on laws.
- Focus is on the past.

Restorative

- What happened?
- Who has been affected? How?
- What can be done to repair the harm?
- Group collectively decides how to repair the harm.
- Focus is on the future.

Impact on Communities

- Holds People Accountable
- Improves Relationships
- Identifies Root Causes of Behavior
- Connects People to a Support Network
- Collectively Resolves Crime

Impact on Communities

- Victims often report, "Justice has been served".
- 95% of the cases result in agreement.
- Helps resolve things in as few as two weeks.
- Avoids the sometimes lengthy wait for official action from courts or other institutions.
- Cost effective: 1/10th the cost of court proceedings.
- Rate of recidivism is 60% less than formal juvenile justice intervention.*
