#### Responsibilities of Children's Counsel in Delinquency

- \* California Rule of Court 5.663 (formerly CR1479 July,
- \* Ensures post-disposition representation, "Counsel must continue to represent the child unless relieved by the court..."
- \* Provides for the ancillary and collateral needs of youth in the delinquency system

## The Need Why do we need post-disposition advocacy??

- \* Disproportionate representation of high-needs minority youth in the juvenile justice system
- \* High rates of placement failures and recidivism
- \* Extensive detention lengths of stay for youth awaiting
- Advocate for appropriate placement to meet individualized needs of the client and family
- Reduced AWOLs and placement failure
   Earlier graduation from placements
- \* Successful termination from juvenile probation

- \* The Courts
- \* Community Based Agencies
- \* Juvenile Probation Department
- \* Public Defender
  - \* Dedicated Placement/education attorney
  - \* Dedicated Social Worker

# The Role of the Post-Disposition

- \* Provides legal representation for all clients who are committed to out of home placement
  - \* All those committed are in custodial detention awaiting placement
  - \* Assesses the client for individualized needs
  - \* Works with juvenile probation and community based services to identify most appropriate placement
  - \* Maintains contact with the families to address legal issues and other concerns

## By the Numbers Prior to 2011

- \* In 2008
  - \* African American Youth
    - \* 47.9% of juvenile probation referrals
    - \* Only 12% of SF youth aged 10-17
    - st 78% of Out of Home Placement FAILURES
  - \* Latino Youth
    - \* 25% of juvenile probation referrals

    - \* Only 23% of SF youth aged 10-17
      \* 21% of Out of Home placement FAILURES

#### By the Numbers JCRT results since 2011

- \* Reduced Recidivism
  - \* 12% for JCRT youth
  - \* 41% for non-JCRT youth
  - \* 81% for DJJ youth

## By the Numbers JCRT results since 2011

- \* Private bar youth recidivism rate- 70% in first 6 months after returning from placement and county camp
- \* NOW, recidivism rate is at 8% in first 6 months
- \* 4 years ago 290 OHP commitment orders
- \* LAST YEAR reduced to 99 OHP commitment orders

## Objectives of Juvenile Court Reentry Team

- \* 100 youth per year of Public Defender client
- 100% of youth undergo a full risk/needs assessment for adjudication (YASI) to inform appropriate placement and service planning
- \* Updated assessment as part of case planning at time of review hearings and 6 months prior to release
- \* Families receive intensive support beginning 3 months prior to release

# Objectives of Juvenile Court Reentry Team (continued)

- \* Comprehensive Individualized Reentry Case Plan
  - \* Housing
  - \* Vocational training
  - \* Completion of education
  - \* Therapy or drug treatment and additional services
- \* Link youth to aftercare services 6 months post-

## **CASE PLANNING How to Ensure Success**

- $* \;\; {\sf School} \, {\sf assignment} \, {\sf and} \, {\sf placement} \, {\sf prior} \, {\sf to} \, {\sf release} \, {\sf date}$
- Defender and Social work advocacy for current IEP plans for special education youths
- Family reintegration and counseling prior to and after release
   Assessment and provision of individualized counseling to address substance abuse, anger management, behavioral and mental health needs
- Consideration of vocational readiness and employment opportunities
- Gender and Sexual orientation services to meet the special needs of girls and LGBTQ youth

#### Foster Care Youth

- \* New extended foster care benefits for foster care youth AB12 to provide successful emancipation for youth to age 21
- \* Ensure that record sealing is a priority as an established protocol for the courts and probation
- \* Provide a fresh start for youth in securing employment and future success
