

Overview of 2011 Realignment Transfers Over \$6 Billion in Services Adult offenders and parolees. Law enforcement grant programs. Mental health and substance abuse programs. Foster care and child welfare services. Adult protective services. CalWORKs funding. Court security.

Overview of 2011 Realignment Provides counties with equivalent ongoing funding sources Just over 1 percent of state sales tax. Certain VLF revenues. State savings primarily from proposition 98 \$\$\frac{98}{2}\$ billion.

Low Level Offender Realignment

- Makes low level offenders ineligible for prison
- No current or prior serious, violent, or sex offense.
- Other exceptions.
- 5,500 offenders to be realigned in 2011-12
- \$162 million provided in 2011-12
- Changes sentencing options
- Split sentences.



Parole Realignment

- Makes counties responsible for post prison supervision for certain offenders
 - Current nonserious, non-violent convictions.
 - Some exceptions.
- 20,000 offenders realigned in 2011-12
- \$127 million provided in 2011-12
- Requires courts to handle revocation hearings
- 8,000 to 9,000 hearings.



Parole Revocation Realignment

- Makes counties responsible for housing state parole violators
 - · Some exceptions.
- 2,600 parolees to be housed in jail in 2011-12
- \$78 million provided in 2011-12
- Beginning in 2013-14, requires courts to hear state parolee revocation hearings



Why Realignment Makes Sense

- Counties are better positioned for success
- Cross departmental coordination.
- · Local innovation.
- Increased incentive for prevention.
- Gives counties access to new tools
- Reduces cost of the system
 - Counties have lower cost.
 - . Eliminates duplication of effort.
- Addresses prison overcrowding



County Community Correction Plans

- Alternatives to incarceration
- · Affects existing and new populations.
- Parole
- Identifying offender needs.
- Treatment programs
- Jail expansion
- County response key to success.
- Quality of programs.
- · Adequacy of funding.



Making Realignment Work for Long-Term Success

Develop long-term allocation formulas
Simplify local account structure
Give counties program flexibility
Align fiscal incentives and statewide goals
Promote local accountability
Define state's role
Avoid state-reimbursable mandates
