GRANT OPPORTUNITIES

Community-Based Violence Prevention Demonstration Program Deadline: April 22, 2013

Applicants are limited to states (including territories) and units of local government (including federally recognized tribal governments, as determined by the Secretary of the Interior). Applicants must demonstrate a significant crime and violence problem affecting youth (specifically, high levels of aggravated assaults, shootings, and killings over an extended period of time) to be eligible for this program. OJJDP welcomes joint applications from two or more eligible applicants; however, one applicant must be clearly indicated as the primary applicant (for correspondence, award, and management purposes) and the others indicated as coapplicants. OJJDP expects applicants to have strong support within local government. Specifically, successful applicants will be those cities, counties, states, or tribal governments that have signed letters of support from, at a minimum, their mayor or chief executive officer, chief of police, and the local school superintendent and have proven how the implementation of their comprehensive, community-based violence prevention strategy fits into their jurisdiction's youth violence prevention plan. OVW Fiscal Year 2013 Tribal Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Coalitions Program Deadline: April 25, 2013

Applicants are limited to: (1) current grantees who are seeking funding to continue projects that were funded in Fiscal Year 2011 or earlier; and (2) new applicants, which include established nonprofit tribal coalitions that formerly received funding from the Tribal Coalitions Program, as well as first-time applicants that have never before received funding from the Tribal Coalitions Program. First-time applicants must be incorporated as a nonprofit organization, must be able to provide proof of incorporation, and must have a primary mission of addressing crimes of sexual assault and/or domestic violence committed against Alaska Native and American Indian women. OVW Fiscal Year 2013Tribal Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Coalitions Program Deadline: April 25, 2013

The Tribal Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Coalitions Program (Tribal Coalitions Program) assists nonprofit organizations and individuals or groups of individuals to build Indian leadership and capacity in tribal communities to advocate for systemic change that will enhance the safety of women in an Indian Triba. Tribal Coalition nonprofit organizations have accomplished this through technical assistance, expanding the capacity of the tribal coalitions, developing or enhancing appropriate standards for tribal governments, tribal nonprofit organizations, tribal organizations, victim services and victim service providers to increase the ability of these entities to address sexual

assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking. In the Violence Against Women and Department of Justice Reauthorization Act of 2000 (VAWA 2000), Congress first authorized resources for the development and operation of nonprofit, nongovernmental tribal domestic violence and sexual assault coalitions. Today, there are 19 established Tribal Coalitions. Face Forward Serving Juvenile Offenders Grants Deadline: May 10, 2013

The U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration (ETA), announces the availability of approximately \$26,000,000 in grant funds to award approximately 26 Face Forward grants. "Face Forward" conveys the idea of youth leaving their past transgressions behind and looking forward towards a promising future. Through diversion and/or record expungement strategies, these grants will give youth a chance to succeed in the workplace and to avoid the stigma of a juvenile record. The purpose of these grants is to improve the long-term labor market prospects of both court involved youth prior to adjudication and juvenile offenders. OJJDP FY 2013 Juvenile Drug Courts Training and Technical Assistance Program Deadline: May 13, 2013

This program supports training and technical assistance (TTA) for states, state and local courts, units of local government, and Indian tribal governments to build their capacity to develop, maintain, and enhance juvenile drug courts for substance-abusing youth. OJJDP is seeking a provider to deliver TTA to juvenile drug courts in best treatment practices for adolescents and court operations, based on the Sixteen Strategies of Effective Juvenile Drug Courts (hereafter referred to as the Strategies). The program is authorized by 42 USC Section 3797u-8.

OJJDP FY 2013 National AMBER Alert Training and Technical Assistance Program (CFDA #16.543) Deadline: May 13, 2013

This program provides training and technical assistance support to enhance the national AMBER Alert network; increases and improves law enforcement response to missing, endangered, and abducted children; increases the recovery rate of abducted children; strengthens child alert systems in the nation's northern and southern borders to better protect American children abducted to or through foreign countries; creates greater community capacity in understanding broader issues related to exploitation and abuse of children; and enhances public participation in the recovery of missing, endangered, and abducted children. The successful applicant will work closely with OJJDP, the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC), the International Centre for Missing & Exploited Children (ICMEC), and appropriate agencies, organizations, and professionals to provide training and technical assistance to law enforcement agencies, AMBER Alert coordinators, child

protection professionals, broadcasters, and others concerned with child abduction and victimization. OJJDP FY 2013 National Juvenile Justice Data Analysis Program

Tribal Title IV-E Plan Development Grants

Deadline: May 14, 2013

The purpose of this funding opportunity announcement is to make one-time grants to Tribes, Tribal organizations, or Tribal consortia that are seeking to develop, and within 24 months of grant receipt, submit to the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) a plan to implement a title IV-E foster care, adoption assistance and, at Tribal option, guardianship assistance program. Grant funds under this announcement may be used for the cost of developing a title IV-E plan under Section 471 of the Social Security Act (the Act) to carry out a program under Section 479B of the Act. The grant may be used for costs relating to the development of data collection systems, a cost allocation methodology, agency and Tribal court procedures necessary to meet the case review system requirements under Section 475(5) of the Act, or any other costs attributable to meeting any other requirement necessary for approval of a title IV-E plan.

This initiative aims to enhance tribal efforts to increase youth engagement, coordination, and action related to juvenile justice, delinquency prevention, and public safety in Indian country. The recipient will employ multiple strategies, including national and regional learning events, to strengthen the ability of tribal youth to initiate, contribute to, and participate in culturally relevant efforts that reduce risk factors and enhance protective factors in youth, schools, communities, and families. Research and Evaluation on Children Exposed to Violence Deadline: May 20, 2013

NIJ is seeking multidisciplinary research and evaluation proposals related to childhood exposure to violence. In particular, NIJ seeks applications that address polyvictimization, Internet harassment/electronic aggression (e.g., bullying through Facebook, harassing e-mails), resilience, or justice system responses to children identified as being exposed to violence. For the purposes of this solicitation, "Children Exposed to Violence (CEV)" encompasses a broad area that includes children as both direct victims and as bystanders or observers of various forms of violence in the home, school, or community (including, but not limited to, peer victimization/bullying/harassment, child maltreatment, domestic violence, and community violence). Under this program, the successful applicant will operate the OJJDP National Training and Technical Assistance Center for Youth in Custody (the Center) to provide resources, training, and technical assistance for state, local, and tribal departments of juvenile justice and corrections, service providers, and private organizations that operate juvenile facilities. The Center will serve the range of facilities in which juveniles are placed, including detention, corrections and adult facilities, and the unique population of juveniles in these institutions. The Center will emphasize the rehabilitative goals of the juvenile justice system and provide comprehensive training, technical assistance, and resources directly to justice facilities that detain or confine juveniles. The Center will also update and contribute to the knowledge base of best practices in detaining or confining juveniles. Diligent Recruitment of Families for Children in the Foster Care System Deadline: May 31, 2013

This Funding Opportunity Announcement solicits applications to fund cooperative agreements, for the purpose of developing programs to recruit resource families for children in foster care. Applications submitted in response to this announcement should propose projects that will:

- 1. Implement comprehensive, multi-faceted diligent recruitment programs for resource families, including kinship, foster, concurrent, and adoptive families for children and youth served by public child welfare agencies; effectively identify, engage and support resource families as a means of improving permanency outcomes and building lasting connections for children in foster care;
- 2. Integrate the diligent recruitment programs into the Child and Family Service Plan and with other agency programs, including foster care case planning and permanency planning processes, to facilitate active concurrent planning activities;
- 3. Demonstrate the capacity to use this project as a transformative platform for improved system response to permanency and building connections, incorporating changes at the policy and practice level and embracing the philosophy of permanency beginning at entry into the child welfare system;
- 4. Evaluate the implementation of the comprehensive diligent recruitment programs to document processes and potential linkages between diligent recruitment strategies and improved outcomes; and
